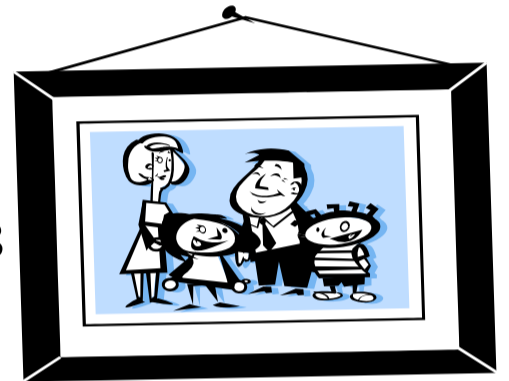

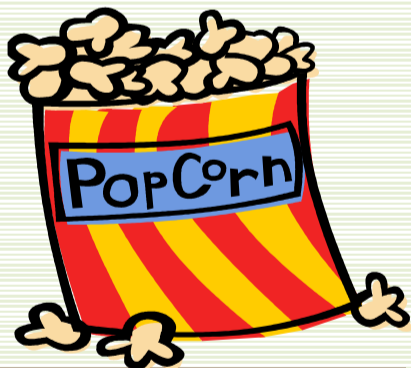

Cold Weather Safety

Emergency Medical Services (EMS) paramedics respond to a number of cold weather related emergencies every winter. However, by taking appropriate measures to dress properly, anticipate sudden weather changes and preparing to be out in the cold, may reduce your risk of sustaining a cold weather illness/injury. It's also advised you store an emergency kit in your vehicle at all times containing extra clothing, blankets and other road-side supplies.

Frostnip

- Frost-nipped skin is extremely cold, but not yet frozen skin;
- It commonly affects the ears, nose, cheeks, fingers and toes;
- The skin may look red and possibly feel numb to the touch;
- When treated promptly, frostnip usually heals without complication;
- Move to a warm environment and immediately, but gently, re-warm the affected area through skin to skin contact (i.e. hand covering tips of ears).

Frostbite

- Frostbite occurs when skin becomes so cold, the skin and underlying tissues freeze;
- Affected skin may look white & waxy and will feel hard to the touch;
- Move to a warm environment immediately and place the affected area in warm, *not hot*, water, until fully re-warmed;
- Call 9-1-1, or seek further medical attention as required.

Hypothermia

- Hypothermia is abnormally low body temperature, less than 34°C (as compared to normal body temperature of about 37°C);
- Early hypothermia may manifest as profound shivering; moderate hypothermic patients may act inappropriately: stumbling, mumbling, and fumbling, as their body temperature continues to drop resulting in severe hypothermia (<30°C);
- Left untreated, severe hypothermia may progress to unconsciousness or death;
- Early recognition and prompt medical attention is key. Call 9-1-1. Don't forget to protect yourself from the factors that originally lead to the patient's situation;
- Initiate gentle re-warming as quickly as possible. Remove any wet or constrictive clothing; cover with blankets, or sleeping bags. Protect from further heat loss: eliminate contact with cold surfaces, and shield from wind and moisture.

Winter Sidewalk Maintenance

Public Service Announcement
Dealing with snow is a big part of being an Edmontonian.

Failure to maintain your walks could result in a \$100 fine and cleanup costs. Warnings are a courtesy and will not always be issued.

What is my role?

Community Standards Bylaw 14600 requires homeowners and tenants to clear snow and ice from every walk and driveway on or beside their property. Don't forget about any other properties you own, including derelict and vacant buildings - they have sidewalks that need to be shovelled too.

My neighbours haven't been shovelling their walk. What can I do?

If you have a concern about a neighbour's uncleared walk

discuss the concern directly with your neighbour. Be a Snow Angel by offering to help them keep it clear if needed.

Do you need help shovelling? Please contact the South West Edmonton Seniors Association (780-860-2931) for the following postal codes: T6G, T6H, T6J, T6R, T6W

Tips:

-Applying sand to your sidewalks improves traction for pedestrians but is only a temporary measure - clearing right to the sidewalk is always best.

-Free sand is available at the City's roadway maintenance yards and participating community leagues or for purchase at your local hardware store.

-Sidewalk and driveway snow should be shovelled onto the yard, not the street.

-Consider helping a neighbour. Many citizens need help due to mobility or health issues and might not always ask for help. Property owners are also responsible for clearing snow from every walk and driveway on or beside any

vacant properties they own.

Keeping our sidewalks free of snow and ice is critical in keeping Edmontonians moving safely and enjoying winter.

My commitment to you as a Ward 9 resident is to always respectfully listen to your comments and concerns about municipal issues.

Southwest Edmonton Farmers' Market (SWEFM) - Another Season Comes To A Close

Our wonderful market is done for another season, and we have so much thanks to give! The SWEFM would like to express enormous gratitude to the customers who support our wonderful market. This year we had the biggest year ever, with over 70 tents set up on some market days, and an average of 1500+ people attending each market (on our busiest day, we had 2400 people attend!).

We had a great mix of returning and new vendors this year, which made for a vibrant and fun market mix every week. By shopping at your local market, you are supporting hard-working, local people, and stopping local dollars from bleeding out of the community (and city) to big corporations.

Our Sprouts program (children's nutrition program) was yet again an enormous success, with more than 1300+ children signing up this year. This program is run by the amazing Emily Hendsbee, with a ton of help from her family and local university students. These wonderful ladies run the Sprouts tent at the market and write the recipes that are handed out to the kids weekly (did you know that over the winter these recipes are created in their kitchens, and tested and tweaked until the flavour is just right?!).

Have you ever considered how fortunate we are to have a fantastic market like the

SWEFM in our backyard? How great is it to be able to walk or cycle from many of our homes to the neighborhood market, whether it be to shop for our groceries, visit with community members, or to enjoy a food truck meal together as a family as a treat on a warm summer's day?

While winter may seem like it lasts forever at times (making it seem like the next market season is ages away), the planning for the next season's market continues all through the winter with the SWEFM Steering Committee. This dedicated volunteer group meets monthly and plots and plans how to make the market even bigger, more fun, and more successful year after year. A lot of time and heart is put into running the SWEFM, and this is done nearly entirely on volunteer hours. On the topic of volunteers, we'd also like to give a shout-out to the weekly market volunteers. 12-15 hours of volunteer time is needed per market, and these dedicated volunteers (often local high school students) set up your tables and chairs, put

up our signs, keep the trash barrels empty, and help set up our signature "carrots" around the market trees.

Lastly, we owe a ton of gratitude to our 2017 sponsors. These generous and big-hearted organizations make contributions to the SWEFM that allow us to keep the market running, particularly the Sprouts program (on our busiest Sprouts day, we handed out \$638 worth of tokens that kids aged 4-12 could spend on produce and plants around the market).

So, goodbye loyal market visitors, vendors, & volunteers; we are signing off for 2017.

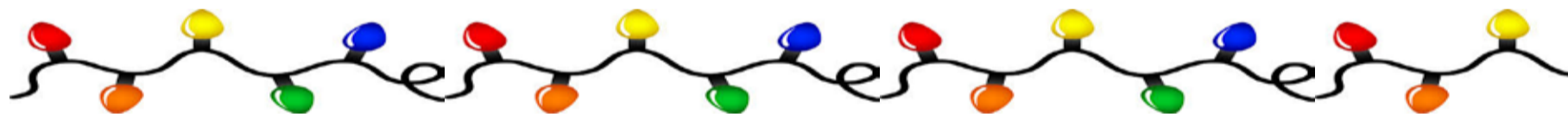

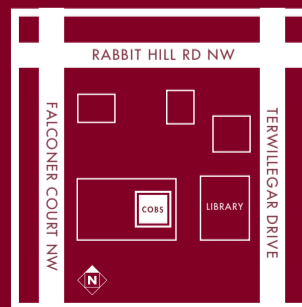
Over the last two decades,

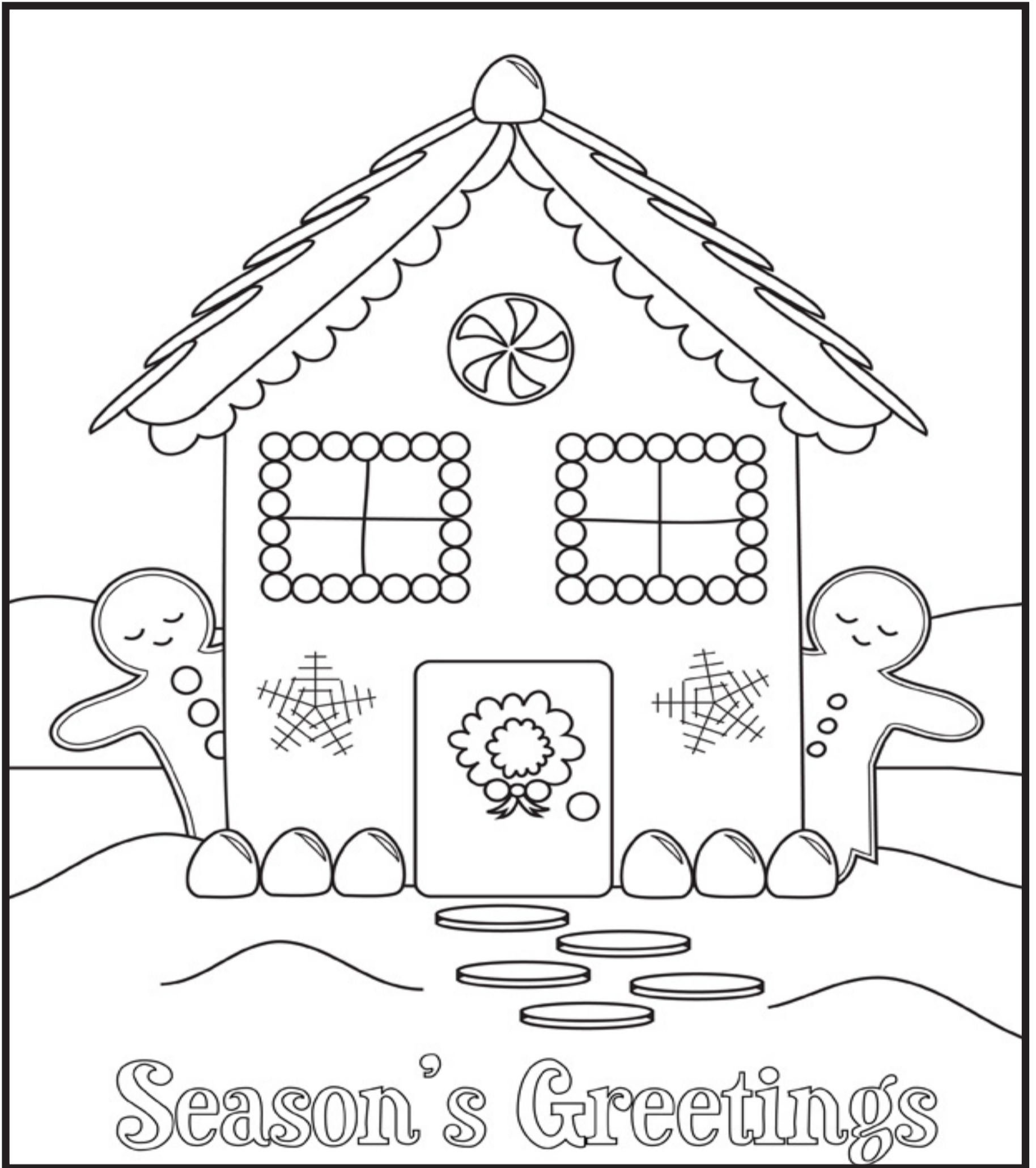

We keep learning about new things with our Toonie Talks that offer a wide variety of topics, including Global Terrorism, Medicinal Marijuana, Wills and Estates, to name a few. From January to September this year, 4849 participants had registered for various programs, which shows strong support for our diverse program selections. Come and join in!

SWESA has a unique organizational structure. It has an administrative office and meeting centre in Yellowbird East Community Centre, as well as forming linkages and partnerships with independent community organizations such as neighbourhood seniors' organizations, recreation centres, and community leagues. This model optimizes the use of the local community resource base and demonstrates organizational flexibility to best meet the evolving needs of older adults in southwest Edmonton. This year we are offering programs in four locations: Yellowbird East Community Centre, Terwillegar Community Recreation Centre, Twin Brooks Community League, and William Lutsky YMCA.

Included in the fall lineup of new courses are pickleball, line dancing,

Our fine arts programs include visual arts (stitching, art group with painters and artists of all levels), music (guitar lessons, drumming circles), and a new workshop for us to organize our photos!

Cards and games, such as bridge, mahjong and canasta, continue to keep the mind sharp while providing friendships and an opportunity to meet new people.

For many older adults who live alone, sometimes cooking a hot meal can seem like a lot of effort to impress only yourself. Food and social interaction are deeply entwined in the human subconscious. At SWESA, we offer cooking classes or demonstrations to help inspire members to learn something new and bring excitement to preparing a meal at home. We also offer monthly themed luncheons where members can come together for a hot meal with games, music, guest speakers, prizes and 50/50 draws. Recently, we had the pleasure to welcome some volunteers from the Ital-Canadian Seniors Association to facilitate a gnocchi-making workshop at our Yellowbird East Community Centre. Our members were happy to meet new friends, learn some new techniques and share a delicious meal. Our monthly lunches include fun and good food.

We also have field trips including the one coming up: Cariboo Magi. This is a live performance at the Rosebud Theatre. Public Skating Guidelines

The City of Edmonton is committed to creating safe, healthy, vibrant spaces. In promoting shared positive experiences we ask all participants to observe the principles of safety, respect and courtesy.

- There will be no on-ice staff available at single pad arenas and before 4pm on weekdays at multi-pad arenas. On-site staff are available during these times, if assistance is needed.
- Age restrictions may apply; please see Public Skate Schedule for details.
- Children ages 8 and under must be accompanied on ice and actively supervised by a responsible person aged 13+.
- Helmets are strongly recommended for all skaters.
- Sledge skating is permitted.
- Use of cell phones and/or headphones while on the ice is not permitted.
- Carrying an infant on the ice, regardless of helmet or safety attire, is not permitted due to the risk of injury to both the child and guardian.
- Skaters should skate at a safe speed. Faster skaters are expected to skate on the outside, with slower skaters on the inside of the rink.
- Skaters should not loiter along the arena boards or in areas that may block the traffic flow.
- Skaters are expected to rest at centre ice. Skaters should not sit on the boards.
- Figure skating is not permitted, except during specified figure skate times.
- Formal or organized coaching is not permitted.
- Those displaying unsafe or inappropriate behaviour on or off the ice will be asked to leave.
- Skating aids are available for public use, however, skaters may bring their own commercially made skating aid product as long as it is in good working order.
- The following items are not permitted during Public Skate, unless specified on the schedule:
 - Sticks, pucks and rings of any kind, including hockey & Ringette sticks
 - Food or beverage, with the exception of sealed water bottles.
 - Toboggans, Sleighs or Wagons
 - Child Car Seats, Baby Carriers or Strollers
 - Blankets, Stuffed Animals or Toys
 - Homemade skate aids
 - Shoes

Is it (House) Hunting Season Yet?

In Edmonton, our lives are really affected by the seasons. Fall means school (and REALLY happy parents). Winter means cursing the weather while being secretly proud that we can handle it. Hockey season means cheering your team on. The upcoming holiday season means enjoying time with family and friends. And of course you can't forget to season your turkey! But what about the housing market – is there a “season” when it makes sense to buy or sell?

Most years, the housing market follows a similar pattern. January and February tend to be slower, the market picks up from March – June, there's a small lull in the summer, a small

bump again in September and October, and then a slowdown in November and December. This year's numbers highlight this pattern. In January there were 738 residential properties sold, with 2185 properties being listed. Compare that to June, when there were 1867 sold and 3427 listed.

Prices tend to fluctuate from season to season as well. Looking at 2017 again, the average price of a single family home was \$416,859 in January, and by June had risen to \$453,735. Price fluctuations tend to net out if you are selling and buying however, so this may not be the most helpful factor when deciding on making a move. For example, you may want to sell in the spring because prices tend to be higher but the price of the home you want to purchase will

likely be seasonally higher as well.

Seasonal weather and the school year are big reasons for this yearly cycle. Moving in the middle of a blizzard doesn't land on many people's bucket lists, and most people prefer not to disrupt their kids in the middle of the school year. More people shop and buy in the spring so they can take possession and move in the summer. Then, when our (oh so short) summer finally hits people would rather head to the lake and have some fun! Reality hits again in the fall and those still in the market want to make something happen before the flurries fly.

If you have no choice and need to sell or buy then the season won't really matter. If you only want to buy then the lower prices in

the winter may be enticing, but there are fewer properties to choose from. If you only want to sell then the increased activity in the spring makes sense, but you tend to be up against a lot more competition. Generally speaking however, spring is the best season for the housing market, so if you're planning a move you have some time to get ready.

Whatever you choose to do, there's no denying that these next few months aren't the best season for the housing market. Instead, focus on getting ready for the holiday season by decorating, doing your shopping and getting psychologically prepared for family gatherings. But whatever you do, don't forget to season your turkey!


