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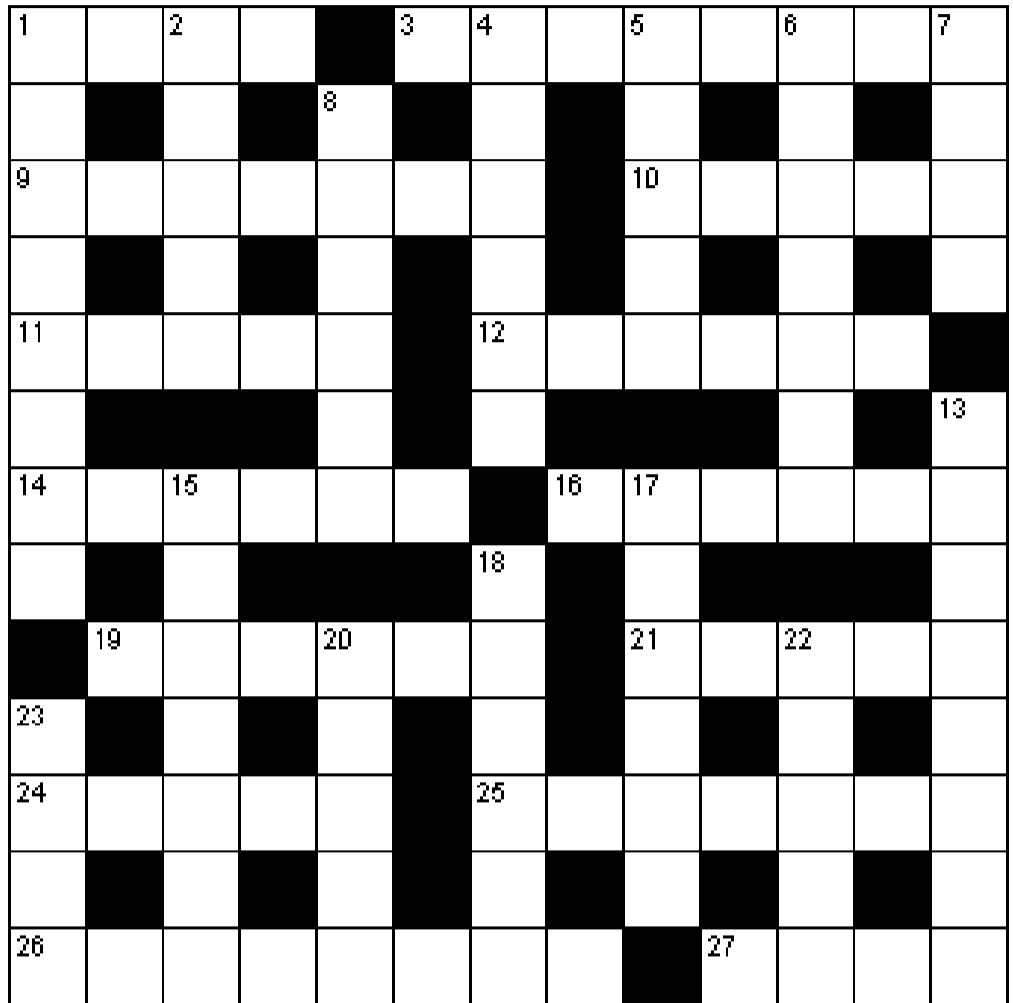

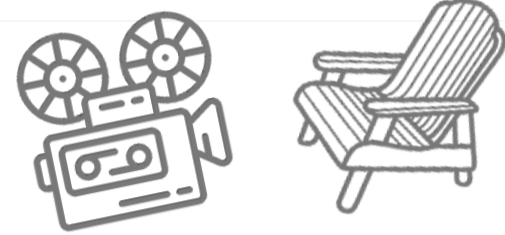

To all you gardeners out there, I just want to say, “thank you!” Thank you for adding so much beauty to our neighbourhood! Spring is such a wonderful and hopeful time of year as trees are budding, flowers are blooming and yards and gardens are beginning to grow and get green.

I love flowers, vegetable gardens, berry bushes and fruit trees; both the beauty they offer and the bounty they provide. As I walk around the community everyday with my dog, I take in the beauty of the many yards I walk by where it is obvious the owners take time to tend to and care for the plants they have growing in their flower beds, baskets and pots.

When I think about gardens, I am reminded that they have been part of God's story from the very beginning. 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Alberta's Future Is On The Ballot - Don't Take It For Granted

The Premier and the UCP government have made the ill-advised decision to proceed with a referendum on Alberta separating from Canada, scheduled for October 19, 2026.

Albertans have been clear: the vast majority do not want to separate from Canada, and they do not want a referendum on separation. Like most of us, I am a proud Albertan and a proud Canadian. I am proud of the role Alberta plays in Canada, and I know Alberta can achieve much more when we lead Canada, not leave Canada.

Alberta is facing a divisive, economically destabilizing referendum on separatism because of Premier Danielle Smith and the UCP government. After a year of enabling her separatist base initiate a referendum on separatism – lowering the number of signatures required, overturning court decisions, and using taxpayer money to appeal a court decision that found the separatist question unconstitutional – Premier Smith has made the choice to proceed with a referendum on separatism with a question written by the government.

This is a government referendum.

The Premier has claimed that “700,000” Albertans asked for this referendum, which is not factual. More than 400,000 Albertans signed the Forever Canadian Petition – motivated by love for their province and their country – because they wanted to stop a referendum on separatism and ensure Alberta remains in Canada. The alleged 300,000 signatures that the separatists gathered on their petition were never verified by Elections Alberta. Even more significant is that some bad actors within the separatist movement had – and may continue to have – illegal access to the personal information of 3 million Alberta voters because of the largest data breach in Canadian history. This calls into question every signature on that petition.

Additionally, reports indicate that foreign, opportunistic actors are exploiting the separation issue to spread division and confusion. With all of this, there are serious questions about whether a legitimate and secure referendum can even be held.

This is not about democracy. If it was, the Premier would have told her separatist supporters to establish a political party, run candidates in each riding in the province, and do the work of persuading Albertans to support their cause. Instead, she has given them a platform to promote their unpopular position with Albertans.

The UCP did not campaign on a separatist agenda in the 2023 election, yet they have intentionally advanced that agenda for 18 months because of a group of people who helped win her the leadership of the UCP party. The Premier has prioritized her political party's unity over national unity.

What Adults Get Wrong About Teen Stress

From the outside, many teens appear to be doing well. Their grades are good, they have friends, and they are participating in their favourite activities. However, many of them describe feeling overwhelmed, stressed, and emotionally exhausted. As parents, it is hard not to compare our own adolescent years to what our teens are going through. The challenge is that adolescence looks very different than it did even a generation ago.



The teens I work with, both as a teacher and a therapist, often talk about how much they are carrying, how they are barely hanging on, and, most notably, how much they try to hide their stress from their parents. They recognize that their parents are stressed, too, and quietly choose to hide their stress so they don't add to that load. Some of the teens who appear to be thriving are the ones trying the hardest to stay afloat. It's no surprise that many parents are left wondering, "Is my kid ok?"

Here are some ideas to ponder the next time your teen huffs in frustration as they storm away from you:

- Teens are doing the best they can. In my experience, teens are

rarely being difficult for the sake of being difficult. They may seem irritable, dramatic, disrespectful, lazy, or argumentative - try to remember that these outward struggles are often signs of inward turmoil.

- Pause and remember that stress is not measured by age. Just because kids don't have mortgages and car payments doesn't mean they don't have stress. Additionally, their prefrontal cortex (the decision-making, organizing, thinking part of their brain) is not fully developed until their mid-20s.

- The pressures they feel are constant, public, and relentless; pressure to achieve, pressure to belong, pressure to figure out who they are, pressure to stay connected, and pressure to appear ok through it all.
- Have I offered advice when all my kid wanted was someone to listen? While our teens do come to us for advice, sometimes they need to vent and feel heard. Next time they're telling you about how hard their day was, try saying, "That sounds hard. Do you want advice or do you want me just to listen?" or "I'm sorry things are tough right now. Do you want a hug?" Full stop. No advice. Just validation.

- Could they be carrying pressures I don't fully see—friendship struggles, worries about the future, perfectionism, anxiety, or fears they don't yet have words for?

Parenting teens can be incredibly challenging, and if you're reading this, chances are you are doing a great job. Your teen is also doing a great job, even though some days it may not feel that way. Continue to be curious about what their behaviour is telling you, compassionate towards their struggles, and trust that feeling seen and understood can go further than having the perfect response. And about that hug I mentioned earlier - don't be the first to let go. You may be surprised at how long they hold on.

Summer Food Safety: Don't Leave Home Without It!

Summer is finally upon us in Alberta! Whether you are staying close to home, camping, or attending festivals, take steps to keep food safe.

Much like applying sunscreen to protect your skin from the sun, understanding and using proper food safety measures can protect yourself, family, and friends.



Food poisoning or foodborne illness is a major cause of illness in Canada. In Canada, one in eight people get sick each year from eating contaminated food. This is nearly four million people each year.

Food poisoning is caused by eating foods that have harmful germs in them. Symptoms are usually mild, but severe illness, hospitalization and even death can happen because of these germs.

Did you know that you can't always tell if food has gone bad by look, smell, or taste? Germs are small and not easily detected. This article offers food safety tips along with ideas to ensure the safety of your food during your summer activities.

Food safety tips!

- When grocery shopping, buy cold or frozen food at the end of your shopping trip.
- Check the expiry dates on packages.
- Wash your reusable grocery bags often.
- Wash your hands before and after handling food.
- Store foods safely. Refrigerate raw meat, fish, poultry as soon as possible or within two hours. Make sure your fridge is set to 4°C(40°F) or lower, for freezer -18°C(0°F)
- Thaw meats in the fridge, under cold running water or in the microwave. Germs can grow at room temperature. Cook foods soon after thawing.
- Use a clean meat or food thermometer to make sure foods are cooked to a safe temperature.
- Use separate cutting boards for ready-to-eat foods (vegetables and fruits) and another for raw meat.
- Use different plates and cooking utensils for raw and cooked foods.

- Serve hot foods hot and cold foods cold.
- Chill leftovers as quickly as possible, using a shallow container to cool the food down quicker.

Grilling at home

- Marinate foods in the fridge not on the counter or outdoors.
- Do not use sauce that was used to marinate raw meat or poultry on cooked food.
- Cook ground meat thoroughly. Ground beef can turn brown before dangerous germs are killed. Use a food thermometer to take the temperature in the thickest part of the meat. Cook until the thermometer reads at least 71°C (160°F).
- Cook meat like roasts and steaks to 63°C (145°F) on the inside.
- Cook ground meat to 71°C (160°F) on the inside.
- Flip meat at least twice to cook it evenly.

Picnics and camping

- When packing foods in a cooler, pack foods that you are likely to use last on the bottom. Pack plenty of ice or freezer packs to ensure a constant cold temperature.
- Fill a cooler to capacity. A full cooler maintains its temperature better than one that is partially filled. Keep the cooler out of direct sunlight and avoid opening it too often.
- Bring a food thermometer for your meat and poultry to ensure your meat has reached a safe internal temperature when cooking.
- Don't let food sit out for more than two hours.



Snacks for outdoor events/festivals

- Bring disposable wipes or hand sanitizer with you to use before and after handling food if you aren't near a handwash station. Handwashing is the preferred method for washing hands.
- Take only the amount you think you will need so you don't have leftovers.
- Consider taking foods and snacks that do not need to be refrigerated like fresh or canned fruit, trail mix, crackers, or granola bars.

Remember: if in doubt, throw it out

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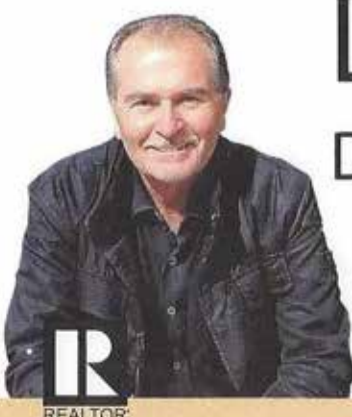
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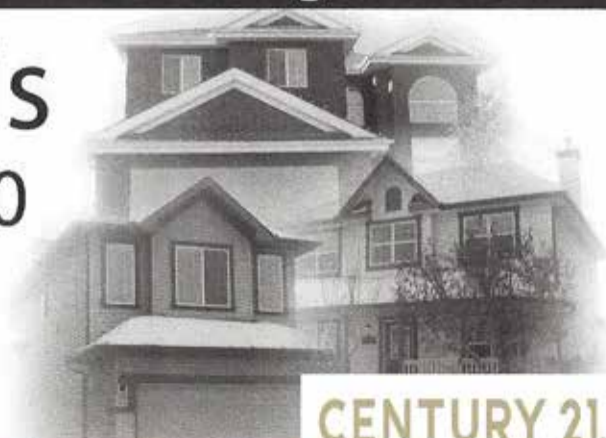

Hello Ward pihêsiwin residents,

Happy June! I would like to share a few key updates with you about some stuff happening in the Ward.

You're Invited to My Snow & Ice Town Hall

My office has been carefully tracking all feedback regarding the City's current Snow & Ice strategy, and I would like to take the opportunity to do a deeper dive into what I have heard so far from you, and also hopefully take this opportunity to hear some new perspectives. 53 Ave Dedicated Bus Lane

Thank you to everyone who has reached out to my office and for sharing your feedback with me regarding opening up the 53 Ave bus lane to private vehicle traffic.

I appreciate the frustrations with the traffic congestion in this area and how this may seem like a viable solution to those problems.

It is important to note that, during the early stages of the Terwillegar Drive Expansion Project, the previous Provincial governments agreed to fund the project on the understanding that it would prioritize and improve transit service for the area. The City's obligation to construct dedicated bus lanes remains as part of the continued Provincial funding agreement. Moving away from the agreement has the potential to jeopardize future funding.

One option I explored was the possibility of converting the bus lane into a High Occupancy Vehicle (HOV) lane, which would allow taxis, ride-share vehicles, and vehicles carrying three or more occupants to use the lane alongside buses. However, this would not be an ideal solution as EPS and the City of Edmonton do not have the resources to properly enforce an HOV lane at this time.

With respect to the suggestion to open the lane to private vehicle traffic during off-peak hours, this is not recommended as it would be difficult for the City to manage and would likely create confusion and frustration among drivers who become accustomed to using the lane when the time comes to change the lane back to a bus-only lane again. Traffic Engineers also noted that this would open up the opportunity for traffic splitting as traffic could use the ramp over the 53rd Ave bridge to bypass the Whitemud. This would be a traffic safety issue.

Recently, I met with ETS to further discuss the planned usage for this bus lane, and they have shared the following with me;

Starting in late June, bus Route 31 will run during weekdays every

15 mins during the hours of 7am to 9:30am and 2:30pm to 5:30pm. The bus will run every 20 mins between 9:30am and 2pm, and will run every 30 mins between 6am and 7am and between 5:30pm to 9:30pm. The bus will not run on weekends.

I understand the concerns regarding the significant investment in this infrastructure and the perception that the lane is currently underutilized. However, with upcoming service changes and continued growth in the area, bus usage along this corridor is expected to increase significantly. Administration has also assured me that they will be monitoring ridership levels, and will be making changes to this route as needed.

In conclusion, I support the bus lane remaining dedicated for bus-use only, as it would be shortsighted to change the use of the lane before the intended system is even implemented. After the system has been implemented and we have the opportunity to see it function as intended, I would be open to revisiting the discussion of converting the lane to an HOV lane again if we do not see a reasonable uptake in transit service for the area.

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Invasive Plants - Hawkweed

Western Canada is home to 14 known native hawkweed species, with a large variations between the species in leaf arrangement and flower colour. Native hawkweeds (*Hieracium*) are a member of the sunflower family, *Asteraceae*, alongside well-known plants such as dandelions and daisies. Native hawkweeds can be difficult to distinguish from their non-native cousins. Generally, native hawkweed's lance-shaped leaves grow up the non- hairy stem (cauline leaves) compared to having primarily basal leaves, like some of the non-native hawkweeds.

Native hawkweeds are an important source of food for pollinators and ungulates (deer, elk, etc.). Thanks to wind dispersed seeds, hawkweeds are usually a species that readily establishes after fire, contributing to the restoration of a healthy ecosystem

There are over a dozen non-native hawkweed species regulated in Alberta, in both the genus *Hieracium* and *Pilosella*. Many of these have yellow flowers and can be difficult to tell apart. The exception is orange hawkweed, which is one of very few orange-flowering plants in Alberta and as such can be easily identified.

Often found growing in groups resulting from rhizome and stolon reproduction, invasive hawkweed species can easily crowd out native plant species and outcompete them for resources.

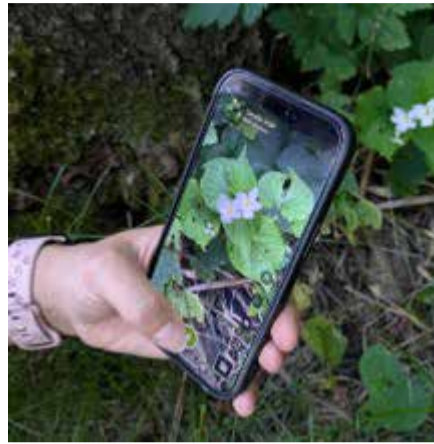
At this time, Edmonton only has two established invasive hawkweed species; orange hawkweed (*Pilosella aurantiaca*) and meadow hawkweed (*Pilosella caespitosa*). These species have hairy stems with hairy basal leaves, and lack cauline leaves.

Fast fact: Your garden is part of nature!

Plants are not just decor, they are a part of the fabric of life. Although we may think of biodiversity as something outside our fences, our yards and gardens exist as a part of the living landscape in Edmonton. Even within your property, what you plant contributes to ecosystem health at a larger scale.

All organisms on Earth have co-evolved to support life in their native range through complex and often unseen relationships to one another. Protecting these relationships is a significant part of strengthening Edmonton's biodiversity. Native plants support native pollinators and herbivores in ways horticultural and invasive plants cannot. As such, native plants form the foundation of a strong and robust ecosystem.

There is a lot of overlap between the traits of ideal garden plants and invasive species, such as rapid growth, abundant reproduction, showy or plentiful flowers and disease and pest resistance. But these traits are also what allow invasive species to flourish, outcompete native plants and diminish biodiversity.

By reimagining your property as a part of nature in Edmonton and extending land stewardship to your own outdoor spaces, you can encourage the flourishing of biodiversity in your community, and in our City!

Ladybird beetle larvae - the other side of a familiar helper

Ladybird beetles are one of the few insects that have a good reputation. They are appreciated for their bright colors and the work they do helping to control insect pests such as aphids. Despite their celebrity, relatively few people would be able to recognize their larvae.

I've often described them as looking like a cross between a pickle and a cactus!

While they may be less attractive to most human eyes than an adult ladybird beetle, the larvae's drive to grow and develop means that they generally have comparatively much larger appetites. In fact, it has been suggested that a single larva can eat as many as 50 to 100 aphids in a day!

Terwillegar Drive Expansion: Stage 3 Construction Underway

The City of Edmonton, with funding provided by the Government of Alberta, is advancing construction on Stage 3 of the Terwillegar Drive Expansion Project. This stage includes important upgrades to the existing interchange over Anthony Henday Drive, including:

- A new northbound bridge over Anthony Henday Drive
- Repurposing the existing bridge for southbound traffic over Anthony Henday Drive
- Two new loop ramps to allow for free-flow turning movements
- Corridor upgrades with three lanes in both directions
- A new pedestrian/cyclist bridge connecting the Windermere and Haddow communities



These improvements will support current and future traffic, transit and active transportation needs. Construction is expected to take approximately two years to complete.

Sections of Terwillegar Drive approaching Windermere Boulevard, both northbound and southbound, for short periods, will experience lane reductions to accommodate construction required to complete the roadway widening. The work at the Windermere Boulevard intersection is being prioritized and accelerated.

Further south along the same corridor, a private developer is currently widening 170 Street south of Windermere Boulevard. Construction is anticipated to be complete in fall 2026.

During construction, road users should expect congestion and longer commute times. In recent days, the City has worked with the contractor to ensure additional measures have been taken to reduce traffic disruptions as much as possible. The City will continue to monitor traffic flow and remains committed to

working with all parties involved to minimize the impacts on road users. The Traffic Disruptions Map will continue to be updated to reflect the anticipated impacts.

Terwillegar Drive is a key north-south route connecting growing communities across southwest Edmonton. Once completed, the expansion project will increase capacity and provide all users, including vehicles, cyclists and pedestrians, with a safe and efficient route. Stage 3 is the final stage of the Terwillegar Drive Expansion Program.

How NOT to buy a stolen bike

- 1 Check the Serial #. The seller must be able to give you a serial # - ensure it has not been filed off or tampered with. Then search a serial # on BikeIndex.org to make sure it's not stolen.
- 2 Check the Bike. Make sure the bike matches the ad, does not have mismatched parts, and does not have scratches or dents that would indicate a lock was forced open or cut off.
- 3 Check the Ad. If the price is too good, they use a stock photo, lack key detailed information, terrible grammar and spelling, overly anonymous sellers, and if they sell a lot of bikes or their story just doesn't add up, it's time to look elsewhere.
- 4 Check the Seller. If they sell a lot of underpriced bikes, you can't find any contact information or sales history, if they have no knowledge of the bicycle they're selling, and if they won't meet at a safe, public location, find a new bike to buy!

Trust your gut. If it seems too good to be true, it probably is.

Bicycle registration shouldn't be confusing. Nor should you have to go somewhere to do it. And it definitely shouldn't cost you money.

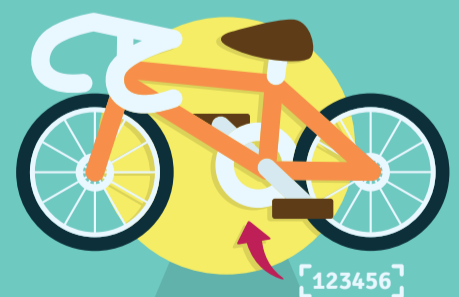
